Social drivers of health and comorbidities continue to contribute to the growing prevalence of vision loss and its impact on ongoing health management across the state of Oklahoma. According to a report published by the Nonpartisan and Objective Research Organization (NORC) at the University of Chicago, the total economic impact of vision loss on the United States is \$139 billion.

The average cost for comprehensive low vision services, per patient, on an annual basis is \$3,485 (NewView Oklahoma, 2022). Most of these services are not currently billable under the existing insurance model, creating access problems for many Oklahomans. The average cost of untreated vision loss to Medicaid, Medicare, and private insurance providers is approximately \$15,900 per patient, per year. In 2019, reports showed 133,942 Oklahoma citizens who are legally blind, indicating an annual economic impact of \$2.1 billion on the state of Oklahoma (American Foundation for the Blind, 2019). These numbers do not include individuals with significant vision loss that will cross the threshold for being legally blind, who are also in need of services and intervention.

Vision loss has been deemed a Public Health Crisis by the Center for Disease Control (CDC). NewView focuses on providing low vision services that empower individuals living with vision loss to maintain their independence, improve their quality of life, save on out-of-pocket healthcare expenses, and self-manage chronic health conditions.

The services our community of donors are helping us to provide are changing health outcomes for thousands of Oklahomans, and we are diligently seeking additional funding sources to continue to change the narrative for Oklahomans living with vision loss.

Our 2022 patient survey does a great job of highlighting the difference we are making for our clients and is a great indicator of how we are impacting health outcomes across the state, and the impact we could be having with increased reach and resources (results are based on responses received through March 20, 2023).

NewView MOVE student plans to work until he's 102

In 2019, Alan was working as a Nurse Technician at Saint Anthony's Hospital. One day, Alan went to the eye doctor due to fuzzy vision. It was there that he learned that doctors would have to perform emergency surgery on his eyes or else he would soon be completely blind. Through the surgery, doctors were able to save 10% of Alan's vision, leaving him legally blind. The severity of his vision loss meant that Alan would soon be out of a job. His position as a nurse technician required him to be able to read very small print on the computer, and the visual acuity to evaluate patients effectively. Everything Alan had known and worked for seemed lost, but that didn't stop him. Alan's wife stepped up to take extra shifts at work so they could stay afloat and make ends meet each month, and Alan had just enrolled in the MOVE Program.
